Will a lot of lorries be thundering through Mary Tavy, up and down the A386 and Station Road?


In late February the Jubilee Group learnt about plans for delivery lorries going to and from the Butcher Park Hill development in Tavistock to use the A386 and Station Road as their route. This will include lorries in excess of 7.5 tons, with several dozen journeys every day, for years.

As soon as we received this information we prepared a sheet and sent it out to everyone in Mary Tavy whose email addresses we knew.

Full information is on the West Devon Planning website – search for 174371.

On the website there are several letters from local residents. The objections include the fact that much of the route consists of very narrow roads; it is much used by horse riders and pedestrians, there is no pavement in most places; there are very soft verges in some parts; there are many tight corners including the turning into Station Road; and there are three small bridges.

We know that Devon Highways is not happy about the use of this route, and perhaps their views and the letters of objection will have an effect – we certainly hope so.

Reporting on news from the Parish Council

In the previous issue we mentioned that the Parish Council was reviewing how it communicates with parishioners. The review has mainly concerned the page advertisement in Jubilee News.

It was reported in the February meeting that the Parish Council had received a number of communications from parishioners, the vast majority of them saying how much they enjoy Jubilee News, but that they weren't sure the Parish Council page represented good value.

Although denied by the Clerk (who has since resigned) we believe the review was brought about by factors other than the wish to consider whether or not Jubilee News was the most effective means of communication.

A couple of issues ago we reported on comments made by councillor John Hill regarding the mention of two petitions concerning cemetery matters. He denied making the comments about editorial control and asked us to publish an apology. However as I had been at the meeting as a member of the public and heard his comments I was not

able to comply with the request.

Furthermore, at the February Parish Council meeting councillor George Hill referred to there having to be consequences for the Jubilee Group not supporting the Parish Council view on cemetery issues, an opinion which he backed up with similar comments at the March meeting.

Prior to the March meeting, the Jubilee Group wrote to the Parish Council to withdraw the offer of advertising space in future issues.

We will of course continue to pass on news from the Parish Council which we believe will be of interest to people in the parish.

To aid their discussions and decision making, the Parish Council asked to see the accounts of the Jubilee Group – a request we find to be out of order for a decision about taking advertising space in a publication. Whilst that request was inappropriate, the accounts have always been available to any member of the public and for ease they have now been published on the Jubilee Group website.

Personal Advertisment by Roger Page (The Pool Guy)

This advertisement is by Roger Page in a personal capacity and not acting as a member of the Parish Council.

I'm sure village politics bores you, but when it comes to money that you have paid in Council Tax, a percentage of which is for the Parish Council, I hope you may be interested in where it goes.

Two items in March's Parish Council meeting were fiercely discussed;

Firstly: That this Council agree the award of the full sum requested by the MTCAGA as a means of ensuring that its legal obligation under S23.1 of the Allotments Act is met. Cllr Bright.

Secondly: to pay a councillor for one day's pay to mend the Cemetery notice board, without prior agreement from the Council, nor following the procedure to obtain 3 quotes for such work.

The grant request was for £4149 (approximately one third of the parish yearly income, or £10 for each household in Mary Tavy) and the payment was for £220. The Council was split between those that wanted to pay both amounts and those that thought more investigation was required.

It was proven in the meeting, that contrary to the printed motion, no legal obligation exists to pay for improvements to any allotments and that the request went against the Parish Grants Policy. In spite of this, the motion was passed by majority vote even though it cannot be implemented without much more information and background checks, so called 'due diligence'.

In the latter case of payment to councillors; This would set a dangerous precedent that all councillors could ask for payment for their time spent working for the Council, which would be disastrous for the finances of the Parish. Currently parish councillors spend many hours on Parish business and receive no money for such work.

Unfortunately, one group of councillors who were in the majority approved both motions.

Even more unfortunately on further investigation the motion to pay a Grant to the MTCAGA, who are trying to set up allotments for 15 parishioners, was proposed by the Secretary of the MTCAGA. As this motion cannot be carried out in its present form due to lack of 'due diligence' information from the MTCAGA, a finance meeting was organized in order to consider this information, but it was not made available in time so another meeting needs now to be organized.

As one who really wants to have allotments in Mary Tavy, it is unfortunate that those councillors are now hindering the process, which will allow the allotments to be created. Their actions (or lack of them) will probably delay the introduction of allotments for another year.

In addition, those councillors, wishing to spend the £4149 and the £220 discussed above, voted not to spend money (30p per issue per household) on explaining the workings of the Parish Council in the free Jubilee News. Thus I am here again discussing the proceedings of the Parish Council.

The Parish Council had requested accounts of the Jubilee Group trust in order to consider whether or not to continue their advertisement. The accounts are available to any member of the public and are also on the web. However, a majority of the Parish Council voted nevertheless to send a complaint to the Monitoring Officer at WDBC and request further investigation with the Charities Commission.

In the last month Kerri Higham, our Parish Clerk, has tendered her resignation due to family commitments. I would like to thank Kerri for all the hard work she has dedicated to the Parish Council in the 2½ years she has been in position. I wish her well in her new position as Chair of the Allotment Association.

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"THANK YOU"

Thank you to the 206 residents who signed my petition last autumn to MTPC asking them to change some cemetery rules to more flexible and kind. After 10 stressful months they have accepted the last words I submitted for my husband Ray's gravestone, so it will soon be in place.

The trouble was that four of the six councillors (later five of seven councillors) wouldn't agree to any change, and two kept trying for a change. I was deeply sad at being denied inscribing a fitting tribute for a kind, brave man who endured so much. The cemetery chairman made me reduce the words and wouldn't allow the most significant ones. I just couldn't accept this, there was nothing wrong with the wording.

My son and I asked them repeatedly to explain why they wouldn't accept the wording, but never got any explanation. It was obvious that one councillor had made it personal against me, I don't know why. He was determined I wasn't going to get what I was asking for.

At the 20 Feb council meeting they were 'put on the spot' by the two other councillors and firmly asked to 'state the reason' once and for all, for their continuous rejection. They did not give a reason, because of course they didn't have a valid one – so they conceded.

All through this, there's been just one councillor whose consistent efforts achieved this satisfactory end to our despondency, we are certain it wouldn't have happened without him. So, thank you Mr Fife Cook, we truly appreciate your fairminded concern in this matter which shames those who lacked this. Sincere thanks again to all who supported us. A dark cloud has been lifted.

I'd like to make a comment:-

As was reported in the last issue, Miss Lupo's mainly online petition of 300 signatures with comments, was dismissed at the Oct meeting because it was 'offensive, containing much unprintable language, extreme bad comments', etc. This was not the case. We could only find one undesirable comment, the rest were, quite simply, home truths. So – the council chairman and cemetery chairman were dismissing views of 300 people, lying about the petition contents being rubbish, in order to continue their stance of 'no change in the rules'. My son and I were there, and saw a display of undesirable characters, and in our view, these two are unfit councillors.

Throughout that decade the Master at Mary Tavy National School was John Merrifield, a remarkable character who is featured in a new book written by Virginia Noonan, an Australian descendent of John Merrifield's brother Samuel.

GOLD-FINDER

a 19th Century Narrative

The fascinating story of one family with connections to Mary Tavy

In the mid-1800s, William Merrifield and his family owned a book titled The Gold-finder of Australia, basically a travel guide for young men who were eager for adventure and keen to make a quick fortune in the goldfields. A wellworn copy of the book was discovered amongst family memorabilia in Australia over a century and a half later, and triggered a journey of research and exploration resulting in a book, bringing to light a series of letters written between 1856 and 1911, mainly between Australia and Tavistock, as well as Mary Tavy.

William Merrifield and his wife Ann had five sons and a daughter; the eldest son Samuel was fired by enthusiasm for the gold rush and departed for Australia in 1854, whilst the next eldest, John, was Master at Mary Tavy National School and an ambitious man who chose to stay in this area.

William had been born during the middle of the industrial revolution, whilst enormous changes were occurring. He witnessed the demise of the agricultural labourer, and his family's descent into poverty. Many were forced to move into towns and to eke out a living in factories and mines. William was determination to rise above the difficulties, to become a learned person and to succeed in life. William became a teacher as well as Librarian of the


Tavistock Subscription Library from 1841 to 1872, and he was also an early Devon photographer, taking stereographic views of Tavistock and surrounding areas. He also kept daily weather records which can be seen in Tavistock Museum.

The family letters provide a great insight into the lives of William's eldest two children Sam and John, in Australia and England.

John (also known as Jack), like his father, had a relentless thirst for knowledge and was a 19th century polymath. After his years as Master at Mary Tayy National School from 1851 to 1862, he was appointed the first Headmaster at Plymouth School of Navigation and won awards for his nautical discoveries. He achieved sufficient national and international stature to serve on a British Association for the Advancement of Science committee concerned with the tides of the English Channel and North Sea. John portrayed himself as a thorough-going radical in religion and politics. This radicalism created many challenges for him, and he clearly thrived on them. John was a driven person, determined to be successful and to ensure his children received university educations

'From Devon to Australia, A 19th Century Narrative' is written by Virginia Noonan, great-great granddaughter of John's brother Sam.

The book is being launched at a signing with the author on Saturday 28th April, 11am to 2pm, at BookStop.
