100th Anniversary of the end of WW1

This year Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday both fall on Sunday 11th November, and it will be the 100th Anniversary of the end of World War One.

In the next issue we'll include a number of articles in remembrance of those affected by wars in Mary Tavy. If you have a story or a photograph you'd like us to include please do get in touch.

The article below is a press release issued by Harrington Homes, and we thought you might like to read it in full -

Local Community come together to name development

The village of Mary Tavy has seen the disused Blackdown Garage site, become neglected for many years, before a local Devon based developer; Harrington Homes purchased the land in 2017.

Before works could begin there were site and ground investigations that needed to be completed, ensuring its suitability to be developed for housing. There were minor remediation works that needed to be considered, such as the new 35-meter attenuation tank, which is buried underneath the site, and will process the drainage of surface water from across the development.

As the site began to emerge from the street the local residents became curious as to what was intended for the site, what the houses would look like? What the development and street would be named?

Harrington Homes contacted the editorial team at the Jubilee News, Newsletter, seeking the residents to assist with suggesting a name for the development, a phenomenal 70 suggestions were received and forwarded to Harrington Homes to consider. The development Name 'The Burrows' received the highest number of votes in an internal vote, out of the 70 nominations.

Harrington Homes were delighted to pass the welcome news to the Jubilee News who made the announcement in the June/July edition of the newsletter.

Since then the local community have again been in touch with Harrington Homes, seeking to know the road name, although the developer initially thought they would name the road 'Blackdown Close' paying

homage to the garage, which was previously located on the site. However, this didn't receive a great deal of support locally, instead, the locals suggested 'Higman Close' paying tribute to Reverend John Higman, deceased. Reverend John Higman was a local resident in Mary Tavy, having spent his childhood within the village. He initially worked for Trading Standards, before he followed his faith and later became the Parish Priest of both St. Mary's and St. Peter's Churches. He was so well regarded, that some of the residents within the Mary Tavy Community considered it a fitting tribute to secure a legacy that will forever remain in the heart of the village.

Harrington Homes were so keen to continue with the relationships established within the village, they are thrilled to announce the road will be named 'Higman Close'.

Harrington Homes are delighted to hold an open event for those within the Mary Tavy Community, inviting them to attend Coronation Hall on Friday 17th August between; 10:00 - 18:00. This will be an opportunity to meet the developers, view some of the plans, and provide them with the opportunity to ask questions.

This is not intended as a sales event, but an informative day for residents. There is no booking required, as it is designed to be a drop-in event running through-out the day. Harrington Homes said; "We look forward to meeting members of the community in which we are developing."

Might the Coronation Hall and Recreation Ground Trusts become one?

The land on which the Coronation Hall was built in the 1960s belongs to the Recreation Ground Trust (the MTVMRGT) and has been leased to the Hall on a long lease. In December 2016 the lease came up for renewal and it transpired that despite attempts to find a simple way to deal with the legal process it would costs thousands of pounds. So the Recreation Ground Trustees are proposing to invoke a clause which enables them to take back the land.

The plan is for the two trusts to become a single charity, but still with two committees, at least for now. This will be discussed further at an EGM of the Coronation Hall Trustees.

THE KING WAY

In parts of Mary Tavy there remain sections of what is believed to be a 13th century track some of which later became a 17th century postal route, the King Way. The name comes from the route between London and Plymouth along which the King's Mail was taken. The King being Charles I.

In particular the King Way can be seen in parts of Blackdown. You can, if you look carefully, see the King Way alongside the A386 north of the village, appearing as a deep trench between the road and the fence. In other places it is less visible and unless you live in or visit certain properties you are unlikely to be aware of its existence, although on satellite

images a line of trees clearly marks the route. When the Conservation Area was created in 2011 properties around the Royal Standard, including Standard Court and Laburnum Villas, were included in the Conservation Area because the King Way runs behind the properties.

From Blackdown the track used by the King's Messengers went west of the village, along parts of Warne Lane, dropping down into the valley at Wringworthy, meeting the road now known as Old Exeter Road in Tavistock. The turnpike road on the west of the river between Mary Tavy and Tavistock later provided better access for the ore from the mines to reach the newly cut canal to Morwellham, completed in 1822.

In 'Walking Dartmoor's Ancient Tracks: A guide to 28 routes', Eric Hemery writes:

'In an attempt to account for the name-origin of the track, we must rely on both documented history and tradition concerning 'the King's Posts'. Although a regular postal service between the smaller towns of West Devon and east Cornwall was not inaugurated until 1722, a petition of 1630 addressed to King Charles I, concerning 'the King's Posts', specified the need to provide posthorses 'on the Western Stages of His Majesty's Posts'... This resulted in a proclamation dated 31 July 1635 about arrangements subsequently undertaken for post-

boys riding the 'Plymouth Road' - that is, the route from Exeter south of the Moor... It was not until 1720, however, that a regular mounted postboy service was established between Okehampton (then on the London-Launceston postal routes) and Tavistock. In the meantime, the King's Messengers had carried official posts on horseback between the two towns.'

In his 'Guide to Dartmoor', William Crossing writes:

'26.-The King Way. The old road from Tavistock to Okehampton, which was in use previous to 1817, ... crossed the Walla Brook a short distance below Indiscombe, thence running on by Wilminstone, to which place it may still be followed. Beyond this it crossed the Burn near Wringworthy Farmhouse, and ascended the hill on the opposite side, and from this point onward to the Lyd followed practically the same line as that taken by the existing highway. But a track belonging to a time much earlier than that of this old road also ran this way, and that the latter was formed upon it, at least as far as the Lyd, or a little beyond, is more than probable. Further, however, the old road did not follow it, but was carried along the verge of the moor instead of across a part of it as the track was. This is known in the locality, that is to say, from Mary Tavy to Sourton, as the King Way, and though much of it is now obliterated, I have been able by careful examination to trace it from the village of Black Down to Higher Bowden, near Meldon, a distance of between eight and nine miles.'

New Parish Clerk resigns

It was not long ago that we reported that the post of Clerk to the Parish Council was being advertised following Kerri Higham's resignation. We understand there were four applications and the person in the role of Locum Clerk for the interim period, Shane Honey, was the successful candidate. However, having only just taken on the role she has resigned. No further information is currently known.

Hydroelectric Power Station Heritage Open Day Thurs 13th Sept, 10am to 4pm


Take a close-up look at the eighty six year old plant and speak with the team, to find out more about how Mary Tavy produces electricity.

At one time it was England's largest hydro-electric power station, but is now considered comparatively small.

Electricity installers the Christy brothers spotted the potential of using declining mining industry assets for hydro-electric generation. They bought the water rights from the Wheal Jewell and Mary Tavy Mining Company and in 1932 the West Devon Mining and Power Company was incorporated as a subsidiary of West Devon Electricity Supply Company Ltd.

Demand for electricity grew, and in 1936 the company built a second hydro scheme on the site.

Number One Water Plant takes water from the River Tavy at Hill Bridge. The water is collected in Wheal Bennetts Reservoir. Number Two Water Plant takes water from Tavy Cleave, running along a 200-year-old leat to Wheal Jewell Reservoir.

Personal Advertisment by Roger Page (The Pool Guy)

This is an advertisement by Roger Page in a personal capacity and not acting as a member of the Parish Council.

I am again writing this article as a concerned parishioner of Mary Tavy, to highlight some of the questionable spending of your Parish taxes. Recently, the Parish Council has approved over £4000 of parish (your) money on a project to create allotments for a small number of parishioners.

Please understand that I am very much in favour of growing your own fruit and vegetables and of the social aspects of allotments. However, expenditure of this magnitude for a small number of parishioners should be carefully considered, so called 'due diligence', to ensure that the best solution is found.

The plan is to convert the lower part of the Recreation Ground into allotments and for the Parish to pay for fencing, weedkiller and lime as well as a water supply. Is it right for you to pay for the chemicals to make this ground fertile?

The motion which was approved by councillors was put by a councillor who is also Secretary of the Allotment Association, and it would not have been approved without the votes of two councillors, who are Trustees of the Recreation Ground. All three thus benefitting from the deal.

The Parish Council normally asks any organisation requesting money to contribute half from their own resources, however, the Allotment Association has raised no money at all for the project.

Is this the best location for allotments? No alternatives were considered, as an agreement between land trustees and the Allotment Association had already been signed. Many problems were not considered relevant by councillors as they refused to attend two meetings on the subject to consider 'due diligence'. Some of the problems include:

- 1. Mine spoil heaps on the edge of the Recreation Ground could possibly contain heavy metals and arsenic. Was this used to level the playing fields? If so is the land contaminated? The Recreation Ground Trustees explained that the soil had been tested, but refused to give the report to the Parish Council.
- 2. Many allotments become an eyesore with broken sheds and polytunnels and become a nuisance with bonfires on a regular basis. Do we want this in the centre of Mary Tavy?
- 3. Due to its position, the allotment area may cause difficulties for the very successful Bonfire Night celebrations held on the field.

The proper procedure for reaching this ill-considered decision was not followed, including a potentially unlawful decision-making process.

You have the right to have your say in whether you wish £10 per household of your money being spent on a project which may be considered negative for the Parish, at the next Parish meeting on August 7th in the Reading Room at 7.15 p.m.


Yummy Yummy Yummy
