

Get fit, have fun, enjoy being outdoors

It's here! the Outdoor Gym equipment has been delivered and installed, and is available for anyone to use, at any time.

The Gym has been purchased by the Jubilee Group, thanks to a Tesco Bags of Help community grant.



There will be a number of training sessions using the Gym equipment, starting after the holidays.

In the meantime, just have a go, and enjoy it.



The Outdoor Gym is in the Recreation Ground, just to the side of the Coronation Hall near the changing rooms. The Jubilee Group is hoping in the near future to create a pleasant covered seating area near the equipment, which will help to make the Gym into a social space.

There are five items, which between them allow for a wide range of exercises, suitable for everyone, whatever their ability or level of fitness –



Air Walker: Provides excellent cardiovascular exercise while developing the leg muscles. Allows a full range of movement in the hip joint improving flexibility and strength, without any impact or stress to joints and back. Suitable for all ages and especially for those for whom jogging and power walking are not suitable.

Disabled Arm and Pedal Bike: The disabled arm and pedal bike provides a great way to exercise arms, whilst also providing for those who require it the option to extend the muscles in their legs. This not only improves co-ordination but also helps to promote balance and core stability and muscle strength. The cycling motion helps to increase blood flow in the lower half of the body.



Air Skier: By swinging both legs together from side to side the Air Skier strengthens and develops the lower abdomen, hips and thighs. Improves balance and co-ordination through "core" activation. Excellent warm-up and work-out for skiers and gentle exercise for fitness beginners.

Push Up and Dip Station: Two sets of parallel bars set at different heights allow for push-up and dip exercises and inclined press ups or assisted squat, a strenuous calisthenic exercise to develop strength in arms and shoulders. Can also be used for knee raises.



The Rider: Similar to a rowing machine but in a more upright position, The Rider gives a full-body cardiovascular and toning work-out, pushing with the legs while pulling with the arms against resistance. Works arms, shoulders, back legs, abdomen and legs, with low impact exercise.

The Trustees of the Recreation Ground have recently painted the lines on the tennis court and have made the other court suitable for small-scale 5-a-side football. The basket ball hoops are due to be replaced very soon. If you use these courts the Trustees would appreciate a donation, which can be made through the PO & Stores.

Shakespeare with local connections

Marian says "I am extremely thankful to have the opportunity to visit Mary Tavy on a regular basis and I have had the pleasure to meet many of the local community. I look forward to celebrating Shakespeare's 400th Anniversary with you all."

This is not the first time Andrew and Marian have performed for Devonshire people as they have recorded plays, poems and readings for the local branch of Talking Newspapers, edited by Sue Jarvis.

Home from Home

In order to be able to make appropriate decisions about future planning, the Parish Council recently asked for information about the number of second homes in Mary Tavy. The information provided by WDBC came from the 2011 census.

At that time there were 26 second homes in Mary Tavy, which is 6.7% of all homes in the parish.

All our neighbouring parishes had a higher percentage of second homes, Brentor having 18.3%. The average for West Devon was 8% and the national average 4.3%.

At about the time of the census it was reported that Mary Tavy had a need for 16 affordable homes. Whilst it is understandable that people would want a second or holiday home in this area, it seems a shame that there are families - some with relatives here, some including people who work in the parish - who weren't able to find a suitable home.

Mary Tavy Parish Council

In early June MTPC received enquiries concerning a printed questionnaire that had been delivered to all households titled "Housing Need Survey for the parishes of Mary Tavy, Peter Tavy and Brentor." A statement explaining the position of your Parish Council was posted on our website, our official noticeboard and in the pages of The Blackdown News. For those who missed our response I have been asked to repeat that the document and the company who sent it out have no connection to MTPC. At no time were Councillors or Clerk contacted by Chris Broughton Associates and we have no knowledge of the identity of the developer who commissioned the survey. I must also stress to all parishioners that, as far as we are aware, no additional sites have been identified for housing development and the redundant garage and bus depot sites remain the only areas subject to planning proposals and ongoing negotiations for redevelopment. We also made it clear that parishioners should feel free to respond to the survey or not as they judge to be appropriate. We also advised parishioners to be aware of the need to protect confidential information and to think very carefully before parting with personal details particularly when cash incentives, small or otherwise, are offered. Our investigations into possible housing development also revealed that there has been an increase in second home ownership. Statistics on such matters are difficult to come by but figures from the 2011 census have revealed that in that year there were 26 second homes out of a total of 387 dwellings in Mary Tavy. We can all only speculate as to how much that figure has increased in the last 5 years.

The ongoing closure of Brentor Road has also generated a considerable amount of comment and speculation. This closure has been caused by the partial collapse of the cattle grid which separates the Blackdown part of Mary Tavy from open moorland. Many road users, rather than face a lengthy and inconvenient detour have been making use of the main bypass gate to the side of the road grid but sadly there have been reports of this gate being left open after use. In such circumstance the straying of farm stock into the village and onto other roads is a very real possibility. As there are no signs of the necessary major repairs being carried out in the immediate future we must ask all who use the bypass gate to negotiate it carefully to avoid further damage ~ a new gate post had to be installed this week ~ and to ensure that it is left closed as a matter of good country practice.

When local residents encounter damage to the highway or blocked road drains in the parish we must remind you that the first point of contact to register such problems should be Mrs. Higham, our Parish Clerk. She will know who to contact and this ensures an efficient recording of such problems and hopefully as speedy a response as possible. As much of our drain cleaning service is programmed by the relevant authority to specific times in the vear, keeping our Clerk informed of blockages ensures that they are brought to the attention of those undertaking such work. Mrs. Higham cannot be available all day every day but she can promptly deal with problems recorded on her answerphone. She may be contacted on 01822 810786.

Representatives of MTPC were delighted to attend, on 29th June, the 180th anniversary celebration of the founding of Mary Tavy & Brentor Community Primary School. The positive and happy atmosphere routinely generated by pupils and staff was very much on display and helped visitors to appreciate why Ofsted inspectors have rated the school so highly. Successive generations of local families, including my own, received their basic education here. Treasured photographs from family archives, some dating back to the 1890s are emerging showing our ancestors being solemnly paraded as the roll of Mary Tavy Board School. These were the days of Forster's Elementary Education Act of 1870 and its successors when children attended school until they were 10 (11 in 1893 and 12 in 1899) and parents contributed towards the cost by paying 1d per week per child ~ the so-called "school pence."

Elderly school premises on narrow village roads produce obvious road safety problems. MTPC is determined to support the on-going popularity of our Primary School by improving road safety and parking in its vicinity. Our initial approach to DCC has met with what can only be described as a lukewarm to negative response. Therefore, we are restructuring our approach by assessing the views of all parties with an immediate interest. In the next few days we are expecting a formal written response from the Board of Governors which we anticipate will be fully in favour of progressing this important project. The greater the catalogue of support the less easy it will be for our local authority to deny Mary Tavy its proper allocation of safety measures.


New girlguiding groups are being started in Mary Tavy. There will be sections for both Rainbows and Brownies.

A miner, a drunkard and a charismatic preacher The story of Billy Bray who worked at Wheal Frendship Mine

William Trewartha Bray, known as Billy, was born in Cornwall in 1794, the son of a miner but brought up by his grandfather who was a pious Methodist. At the age of 17 he moved to Devon to work at Wheal Friendship Mine. He later recounted the story of his life -

"I got in with a bad company of drunkards. I remember one time getting drunk in the town of Tavistock. When going to our home we met a very large horse in the way. It was late in the night and two of us drunk men got up on the horse. We had not rode far before the horse struck his foot against a stone and fell down. It turned right over and it was very near he had killed us both. But the Lord spared us, bad as we was, thanks be to this holy name.

"Another time we were a company of drunkards coming home from

the alehouse all drunk, and we unhung all the gates from the fields as we came by. We was near sent to jail for that.

"While I was working underground in Wheal Friendship mine in Devonshire I heard a scat over my head. I ran out from where I was working and I think forty tons fell down where I came from. I was spared, so did I not ought to praise the Lord?

"I was pert to the captain that I worked under in the mine and got turned away. I went to another part of Devon and got work and went to live at a beer shop.

"I used to dread to go to sleep for fear of waking up in hell; and though I made promises to the Lord to do better, I was soon as bad or worse than ever. After being absent from my native county seven vears, I returned a drunkard."



Billy married and eventually had seven children. One day, in 1823, he picked up a copy of John Bunyan's "Visions of Heaven and Hell" that gave him a strong desire to be a better man.

He became an enthusiastic, charismatic but unconventional preacher, sometimes bursting into song or dance. His preaching often referred to his drunken days in Mary Tavy.

The Jubilee Group ~ a registered charity

The Jubilee Group was formed in July 2012 as a Charitable Trust, following the same rules and principles as other charities, but we weren't able to register with the Charity Commission as our turnover was below £5,000. Now, thanks to the grant for the Outdoor Gym equipment, our turnover well exceeds that and we are in the process of becoming a registered charity. This will make little difference except that it will be easier to apply for some forms of funding.

At the same time we are registering for VAT. This means that when we buy equipment we will be able to recover the VAT, and we will therefore be able to do much more with grant income.

There is a downside to this as it means we will have to add VAT to our rates for advertising in the Newsletter. Many businesses will be able to recover the VAT element but smaller businesses may not. However we had been considering increasing our rates as they've remained the same for the four years since we started, but we won't now increase the advertising rates.

As a registered charity we won't have to charge VAT on most other forms of income, and for the overall effect of both of these changes will be to benefit the community even more.
