An Air Ambulance Night Landing Helipad in Mary Tavy?

Devon Air Ambulance are working with communities to develop a network of floodlit community landing sites which will enable them to bring their life-saving service into the heart of communities when it's dark.

Having received a notification from the Air Ambulance, the Parish Council considered options and asked the Trustees of the Recreation Ground if they would be willing to have a landing site located there. At their recent meeting the Recreation Ground Trustees were pleased to support the project.

The Recreation Ground is an appropriately open site with no overhead cables, and being alongside the A386 will make for good access from a wide area and easy transfer from road ambulances.

There would be no permanent fixture other than lighting; floodlighting is of course essential for the helipad for both safety and practical reasons, and the lighting system needs to incorporate an integral mobile phone SMS control box so that the lights can be turned on/ off remotely by the Helicopter dispatch team.

The costs for setting up a community landing site have to be raised by the community. The Parish Council will be applying for funding to cover part of the costs and further consideration will have to be given to finding the rest of the funding.

The proposal is at an early stage, with many implications, including long-term maintenance and insurance yet to be considered.

Growing up in Mary Tavy - 1936-52 Part One

An account of Mary Tavy by Annette van Oppen who was born in 1936 and spent her childhood in Tavy House, much of it during WWII. Annette had been a journalist with the Tavistock Times and later a teacher and was married to Richard van Oppen, Coroner and a Mayor of Plymouth City.

She wrote down her memories in 2006. She died in 2011. Her story is full of wonderful detail and due to its length will be serialised over several issues.

I was born in January 1936; Europe was on the verge of war. During the next 10 years, until the end of World

War II, many things changed for ever – especially in village life. At Tavy House there were people living with us who helped to look after everything – a nanny for the children, a cook/housemaid who was married to the gardener and lived in the cottage in the grounds and a cleaner who came in several times a week – as well as a part-time gardener/chauffeur. During the War years all these people left to serve in the war effort in one way or another – and we children ran wild. There was no-one to stop us!

We had ducks in the garden, a pony in the field, two *Scottie dogs, two Siamese cats – and a very big vegetable* garden and greenhouse. We were told to Dig for Victory and we did! The ducks provided eggs, of course, which were then water-glassed ... that is to say, preserved. Everything was saved and re-used. We even had a village Salvage System (organised by the Women's Voluntary Service - WVS) which took tins, glass, rags and paper for recycling. We also had an Air Raid Warden who wore a tin hat with ARP in big white letters on the front, who prowled around the village after dark looking for a house which was showing even a chink of light. If he caught anyone he would ring the bell loudly and serve the inhabitants with a notice telling them that they must cover all the insides of their windows with black cloth to shut out the light (and shut out the Hun!). This did give rather a gloomy feel to the indoors, especially as we had to be economical with electricity as well – but it encouraged everyone to go to bed early!

This had its disadvantages in Mary Tavy, because we were right under the flight path of German aircraft on their way to and from the bombing raids on Plymouth –

and many is the time that we were woken up in the night to go down to the cupboard under the stairs where there was a folding bed made up for me and my brother – in fact I often tell my grandchildren that I grew up in the cupboard under the stairs and they stare at me very suspiciously! One never-to-be-forgotten night Mum called us into her bedroom which looked straight down the 20 miles or so to Plymouth and pulled back the curtains to reveal the dazzling but most awful sight of *Plymouth being blitzed by the German bombers the* orange and yellow flames lighting up the sky for miles around. As a footnote to that, although dreadful damage was done to the city and its citizens, the enemy never managed to get the bridge over the river Tamar which they were convinced (by false intelligence, we later *heard) would be carrying the equipment for the D-day* invasion of France.

Food was definitely scarce during the War – even in Mary Tavy. There were friendly farmers' wives who could be persuaded to part with dairy produce from time to time but this had to be done very discreetly – and even now I won't say who it was! There was also the "black market" of which everyone disapproved but which everyone seemed to use. I can remember queuing for hours at Friends the Butchers in Tavistock for sausages; you had to have coupons for nearly everything and it was quite a palaver doing the weekly shop, so children came in very useful for queuing. The only place I really hated having to go to was the fishmongers and then it was only for herring or whiting – but this was still regarded as a *luxury by Mum, although my brother and I both hated* fish. I think it was something to do with the way it was cooked! There was hardly ever any butter; it was all the hateful margarine (which is still hateful to me!) and it all seemed to disappear before we held out our bits of toast to be spread with that and then covered with home-made gooseberry/rhubarb jam, which made our teeth go black!

Take care during lambing

It is every dog's instinct to chase, even if they are usually obedient and good with other animals, and chasing can do serious damage to sheep even if the dog doesn't catch them - the stress can cause sheep to die and pregnant ewes to miscarry their lambs.

Sheep fleeing dogs are often killed or seriously injured by their panicked attempts to escape.

Dogs chasing ewes and lambs can cause mismothering issues, with lambs dying from starvation or hypothermia when they become separated from their mother and fail to find her again.

Dog bites can cause death in sheep, necessitate them being put down at a later date, or welfare

It is an offence to allow a dog to worry sheep. Worrying includes attacking or chasing sheep and, in some circumstances, farmers are legally entitled to shoot dogs if they are endangering their sheep.

The Countryside and Rights of Way Act which sets out public rights of access to open land states that dogs must be on a fixed lead of 2 metres or less near livestock. Farmers can close areas containing sheep to dogs for up to six weeks during lambing.

Bridge closure

DCC Highways are planning work on Mine Bridge, the bridge on Bal Lane over Cholwell Brook near Brookside Cottage. Work will take place from 13 to 17 March. It is only the immediate area of the



bridge which will be effected so there will continue to be access to the northern part of Bal Lane from beside the War Memorial, and to Horndon, and areas around the School and around the Church from Bullers Hill by the Mary Tavy Inn.

Taming the Dragons

Rachel Day from Mary Tavy and her friend Merry Whitaker walked into Dragon's Den and came out with an investment, an influential Dragon, and a great boost for their business.

LoveKeepCreate takes precious pieces of clothing belonging to a loved one and turns them into a keepsake – recycling the item into a quilt, a soft stuffed animal, a picture

frame, or another item of clothing – to remember that person.

The episode of Dragon's Den was shown on New Year's Day. It is extremely rare for any business to get exactly what they ask for in the Den, but the business concept was so good, the product so pleasing and the pair of entrepreneurs so professional in their approach, that three Dragons offered the \pm 50,000 for 10% of the business, and they chose to accept the offer from Deborah Meaden.

Rachel became great friends with Merry when they trained together to become Army officers. Her husband Chris was also in the Army, and now runs Day's Electricals in Tavistock. The couple who live in The Oaks have three children - Freddie, Charlie, and newborn Harriet.

The idea for the business was developed when, in 2011, Rachel sent a keepsake made from Freddie's babygrows to Chris who was serving in Afghanistan. She put a picture of it on Facebook and the orders began to flood in. Rachel (who has her own Blue Peter Badge!) won an Entrepreneur of the Year award in 2014. She is responsible for the creative aspects of the business and designing new products.

Mary Tavy Parish Council

Devon Highways has advised that between 13th and 17th March 2017 important maintenance work will be carried out to "Mines Bridge" where Bal Lane crosses the Cholwell Brook. This closure will have a significant impact not only on local residents but traffic movements to and from Horndon and access to our Primary School. We are attempting to determine if pedestrian access over the bridge will be maintained when the work is carried out as it is an important route for parents who walk their children to school. In the light of the narrow minor country roads affected by this closure and the redirection of traffic, particularly large vehicles, we must ask all parishioners to reduce, where possible, on-road parking to an absolute minimum. The paramount need to allow for the unhindered movement of emergency service vehicles at all times must be recognised. MTPC will of course request police supervision of this difficult part of our local road network when this work is being carried out.

2017 will be an important year in the creation of the new Local Plan which is being drawn up by our Planning Authority, the DNPA. This is a key document which will, once adopted, be used to shape all aspects of life in the National Park area. The first part of the consultation process was completed on the 16th December 2016 during which time residents had been asked for their views on how the Park and the communities it contains should, if necessary, be reshaped for the immediate and midterm future. This Local Plan does not simply relate to building houses but defines policies relating to all aspects of life in the DNPA area including local industries and farming. A summary of MTPC's views on some of the key issues identified in the briefing quide to the Local Plan was submitted for consideration by the Forward Planning Department of the DNPA.

Looking forward to the summer of 2017, the next important stage in the creation of the Local Plan takes place. This is the publication of the First Draft which is offered to all residents for further consultation. This is followed by the Revised Draft in the winter of 2017 which will reflect comments and opinions expressed by residents. The complex and detailed process of producing the new Local Plan will come to a conclusion before the end of 2018 when it is formally adopted. We would ask all parishioners to view and respond to the drafts of the new Local Plan as it is our **one and only chance** to influence the decision-making process.

Parishioners will have noted from reports in the media that the Devon Air Ambulance Trust (DAAT) is attempting to establish a network of community night landing sites. As we have all witnessed the chaos that can occur when an incident closes the A386 between Tavistock and Plymouth it is obvious that outlying communities need alternative access to the major trauma centre at Derriford Hospital. Consequently, MTPC and the Trustees of Mary Tavy Victory Memorial Recreation Ground have entered into negotiations with Devon Air Ambulance Trust for the provision of such a site on our Recreation Ground. This location appears to satisfy all the basic requirements but would need the installation of a 10m high steel mast fitted with 2 banks of high power LED lights either powered by solar power or mains electricity, obviously only used at the time of an emergency. The site and its equipment would be funded and managed by the local community through its Parish Council. A site visit with a representative from DAAT has been arranged for early February and we are hoping for speedy progress with this project.

We are very pleased to report that MTPC has been approached by a parishioner wishing to be considered for co-option on the Council. Consequently, we have automatically entered the first stage of the formal process leading to possible co-option. However, we would like to remind parishioners that 3 further vacancies remain unfilled and anyone interested in serving their community should record their interest with our Parish Clerk. As has been pointed out before, applicants should be aware that the position of Parish Councillor requires a great deal more than attending a monthly Council meeting. 2017 \sim 2018 will obviously be a critical time for Mary Tavy with the devising and completion of the new Local Plan and we would appreciate increased membership of the Council to enable us to undertake our meaningful participation in this process.

Victory for the future of our telephone boxes

Following local consultation, DNPA Objections listed for both boxes considered the proposed removal by British Telecom of phone boxes across Dartmoor. Of the 38 on the schedule, DNPA consented to the removal of more than half of them; listing objections to the remaining 18.

Two of the three phone boxes in Mary Tavy were on the schedule for possible removal, as each had only been used for one call in the previous year. During the consultation period objections were made by the Jubilee Group and by the Parish Council, and the result is that DNPA is recommending to the Secretary of State that both are retained.

include "Poor mobile coverage, required for emergency service."

The kiosk near the church is a listed building so there is therefore no plan to remove it. However, it is available for 'adoption' due to low useage and if that happened the phone would be taken out of service; but neither the Jubilee Group nor Parish Council has any plans to adopt it.

So, provided the Secretary of State accepts the recommendation from DNPA, all our phone boxes are likely to remain in place and operating, which is excellent news.

At its January meeting Mary Tavy Parish Council agreed a drop in the precept rate - for the second vear in a row. The reduction will be 2.5%.

Whilst many other councils will be increasing their precept, MTPC will again be making use of reserves as well as carefully managing expenditure.

The Parish Council will receive a further a reduction in the support funding it receives from WDBC but nevertheless has given careful consideration to ensure the budget will balance.

At the same time, the Parish Council is ensuring that the recently increased level of maintenance around the parish will continue, including keeping grass cut and signs cleaned.

Council Tax is composed of several elements including services provided by DCC, WDBC and the Police Authority, with the Parish Council precept accounting for a small element of the charges.
